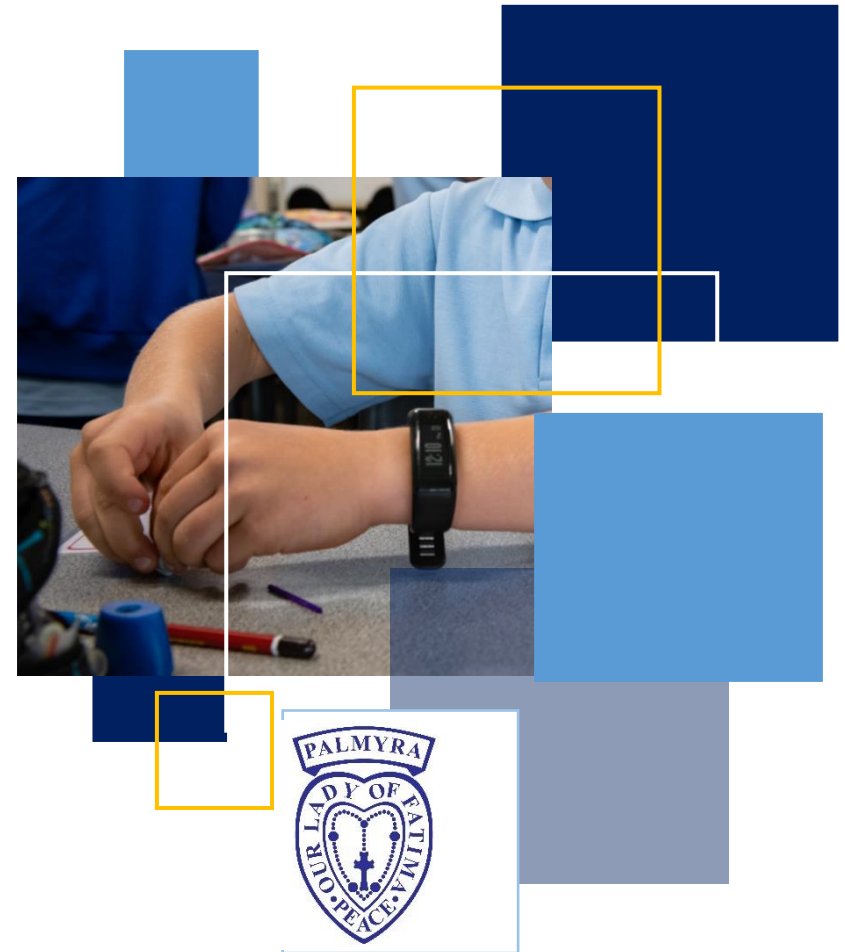

Student Code of Conduct Statements

1. You can act safely and competently.

Always treat others, as you would like to be treated. Think before you act!

2. You give priority to students' safety and well-being in all your behaviour and decision-making.

We all try to make good decisions and choices by telling the truth, being responsible and respecting each other in the classroom and in the playground.

3. You act in accordance with the values of the Gospel and defined in the Code of Ethical Conduct.

We try to 'Make Jesus Real' in our thoughts and actions each day. Respect and love others. We remember to use the gifts from our sacraments in everyday life.

4. You conduct yourself in accordance to laws, agreements, policies and standards relevant to your relationship with the school community.

Do not break the rules of the school community. (School, classroom and playground rules). We need to respect and take care of all school equipment.

5. You respect the dignity, culture, values and beliefs of each member of the school community.

We respect and treat everyone equally with fairness and kindness. We acknowledge and respect other people's gifts, talents and individuality.

6. You treat personal information about members of the school community as private and confidential.

If someone tells you something personal, treat that information as if it was your own and do not share or gossip. It is very important to remember to keep your own personal information safe online.

7. You give impartial, honest and accurate information about the education, safety and well-being of students.

Teachers tell parents how their child is performing in the classroom. They talk about their child's work and about how they are going with their friends. They tell parents when their children are sick or hurt.

8. You support all members of the school community in making informed decisions about students.

We all need to understand that parents and teachers have skills and information about their children, so we need to listen to them. Parents teach their children as well as teachers do and we should trust and listen to parents and teachers. Children have the right to speak to parents and teachers about decisions or if they feel unsafe.

9. You promote and preserve the trust and privilege inherent in your relationship with all members of the school community.

We should all be respectful of each other, respect each other's emotions, and treat everyone with fairness. We should trust each other and be trustworthy.

10. You maintain and build on the community's trust and confidence in Catholic schools and the Church.

Be kind and trustworthy to all. Go to church and volunteer to help by doing altar serving or readings. Listen to your parents, teachers and the priest.

11. You act reflectively and ethically.

Think before you act. Be considerate of other people and their feelings.

12. You allow students to have a voice in their education, safety and well-being.

Students should feel comfortable about talking to teachers about anything and should feel safe at school. Students should be happy coming to school.
